


Where does socialisation occur?

Students had a connection with a mosque or imam suggested as one of the sources of their radicalisation, or had attended a mosque attended by other extremists.

Were pupils of schools that had been accused of having a problem with extremism or had been attended by other extremist pupils





What's the role of online activity?

Online activity appeared subsidiary to real-world relationships.



Online activity was a possible source of radicalisation, including all female students profiled.



However, the majority were not merely passively consuming propaganda but engaging with extremists online.
